3	Lydart Loop	2 miles	14 stiles	Views and history, farmland, one steep ascent and one steep descent
4	Lloysey Loop	2 miles	No stiles	Woodland trim trail, fairly flat
5	Penallt Loop	10 miles	20+ stiles	One strenuous ascent and steep descent, farmland, forest and woodland, church and pub

## INTRODUCTION TO MITCHEL TROY

This leaflet is an introduction to five walks in the Mitchel Troy area that include a short family and dog friendly walk in the forest combined with a trim trail, a walk on the other side of the Trothy Valley from the village, a walk through history with great views, a steep walk up to possibly the best view in Monmouthshire, and a long, quite strenuous, walk through farmland and woodland to view the bluebells in Spring (and other colourful flora and fauna in the rest of the year). The walks are set out in five leaflets, as shown on the chart overleaf, with the distance, number of stiles and a brief description.

### **Church of St Michael and All Angels**

Apart from the Lloysey Loop, all walks begin at the church car park in Mitchel Troy, so do take time to visit the Church of St Michael and All Angels with its medieval lych-gate.

Little remains of the former early thirteenth century church. The tower was built in 1414 and has a stone on the south wall with the inscription "ORATE PEO GODEFRIDO ET IOHANNE". Nothing is known of its origin but it may be a foundation stone. At one time there was a spire on the top but in the eighteenth century this fell through the roof,

possibly after being struck by lightning, and demolished the north aisle. In the tower are three ancient bells with inscriptions bearing the names of rectors and churchwardens from 1656 to 1723.

A very extensive rebuild took place in the 1870s by John Pritchard, the

diocesan architect. Inside there is a large Norman font, with an octagonal stem, and an ornate Victorian font gifted at the time of the re-consecration in 1876.

The 'Ancient Cross' mentioned in *The National Gazetteer of Great Britain and Ireland* (1868) and in *Kelly's Directory for Monmouthshire*,1901, is a fourteenth century preaching

cross, which stands next to the path on steps. Its shaft has chamfered edges set with devices of shields and ball-flowers, which are repeated inside the church on the pulpit and reredos.

Stocks that formerly stood outside the church wall are now located inside the church.

### **Mitchel Troy**

Mitchel Troy may mean Little Troy, with Mitchel being a form of mickle, or it may derive from the Welsh name, Llanfihangel Troddi, which means the church of St Michael on the Trothy. Trothy or Troy comes from the Welsh "troi" meaning 'twist' or 'turn'.

### Postman's paths

Up on Mitchel Troy Common, there are a number of footpaths and green ways that link the various farms and houses. Most of these have existed for hundreds of years, but in recent history they were well used by the local postman as shortcuts across the Common. These paths are shown in red on the map below.

The map also indicates the first part of the paths in leaflets 1, 2, 3 and 5, and the direction to the start of the path in leaflet 4. All leaflet maps are based on Ordnance Survey using the same keys for footpaths, bridleways, permissive paths and restricted byways.
